John Duca

Vice President and Senior Policy Advisor
Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas

Duca coleads and conducts research in macroeconomics and finance for the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas. He has been with the Bank since 1991. Duca has given numerous briefings on the economy to the Bank's president and board of directors. He has published more than 60 articles on money, credit, wages and housing in scholarly journals and Dallas Fed publications. Much of his research analyzes how innovations have altered economic relationships relevant to the macroeconomy and monetary policy. From 1986 to 1991, Duca was a staff economist at the Federal Reserve Board, where he briefed former chairmen Alan Greenspan and Paul Volcker and other Fed policymakers. Additionally, he was a part-time lecturer at the University of Maryland. Duca is currently a part-time lecturer at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. He holds a B.A. from Yale University and a Ph.D. in economics from Princeton University.

Bill Gilmer

Senior Economist and Vice President
Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, El Paso

Gilmer has served as senior economist since 1989 and as the officer in charge of the El Paso Branch since 2003. He comanages the Eleventh District's regional economic analysis and is the editor of two of the Bank's regional publications, *Houston Business* and *Crossroads*. His work on the Texas economy has appeared in publications including *The Economist*, *Fortune*, *Wall Street Journal* and *New York Times*. Prior to joining the Federal Reserve

Bank of Dallas, Gilmer spent seven years on the staff of the chief economist at the Tennessee Valley Authority, producing TVA's annual economic and energy forecasts. He also worked as a research economist at the Institute for Energy Analysis in Oak Ridge, Tenn., and the Institute for Defense Analysis in Arlington, Va. Gilmer earned a bachelor's degree in economics from the University of Texas at El Paso and a master's and doctoral degrees in economics from the University of Texas at Austin.

Jeffery Gunther

Assistant Vice President

Gunther is an assistant vice president at the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas. He oversees analysis of financial institutions and their supervisory environment. His work focuses on the detection of emerging risks to the banking system. He is a primary architect of statistical models used to flag banks in danger of financial deterioration. He also identifies shifts in banking strategies and their implications for safety and soundness. Gunther has authored numerous articles on these subjects for academic and Federal Reserve journals. He received his Ph.D. in economics from Southern Methodist University.

Pia Orrenius

Senior Economist and Policy Advisor

Orrenius is a senior research economist and adviser at the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas and adjunct professor at the Hankamer School of Business at Baylor University. Her research focuses on the regional and national labor



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market impact of immigration, illegal immigration and U.S. immigration policy, and her work has been published in the *Journal of Development Economics*, *Labour Economics*, *Industrial and Labor Relations Review*, and *Demography*, among others. Orrenius is a research fellow at the Tower Center for Political Studies at Southern Methodist University and at the Institute for the Study of Labor in Bonn, Germany. She is also a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. Orrenius was senior economist on the Council of Economic Advisers in the Executive Office of the President in Washington, D.C. in 2004–2005. She received B.A. degrees in economics and Spanish from the University of Illinois at Urbana–Champaign and her Ph.D. in economics from the University of California at Los Angeles.

Harvey Rosenblum

Rosenblum is an economic policy adviser to the president of the Dallas Fed and an associate economist for the Federal Open Market Committee. His research interests focus on monetary policy, inflation and the growing impact of globalization on the U.S. economy and businesses. Rosenblum is on the board of the Western Economic Association International as well as a board member of the Dallas Committee on Foreign Relations. He is also a member of the Advisory Council for the School of Economic, Political and Policy Sciences at the University of Texas at Dallas and a member of the Texas Product Development and Small Business Incubator Board, appointed by the governor of Texas. Rosenblum currently serves as executive director of the International

Banking, Economics and Finance Association and is a member of the editorial board of the *North American Journal of Economics and Finance*. His writing has been included in such publications as the *Journal of Finance*, *New York Times*, *Southwest Economy* and *Handbook of Banking Strategy*. He is a visiting professor of finance at Southern Methodist University. Rosenblum received a B.A. in economics from the University of Connecticut and a Ph.D. in economics from the University of California at Santa Barbara.

Mark Wynne

Wynne's primary research interests are in monetary economics and international macroeconomics, work that has been published in many leading professional journals. He is director of the Dallas Fed's recently established Globalization and Monetary Policy Institute and has taught at the University of Rochester and Southern Methodist University. Wynne has previously worked on issues related to monetary policy strategy under economic and monetary union for the European Monetary Institute and later the European Central Bank. Wynne holds B.A. and M.A. degrees (with first-class honors) from the National University of Ireland (University College Dublin) and an M.A. and a Ph.D. from the University of Rochester.
